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White House Issues Official Proclamation for LGBT Pride Month and Launches New Webpage

In recognition of LGBT Pride Month, the White House issued an official proclamation and launched "Winning the Future: President Obama and LGBT Americans", a new landing page at WhiteHouse. gov specifically addressing the Obama Administration's work "to advance Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender equality and strengthen LGBT families and communities."

The new website features a blog addressing LGBT issues and compiles video statements made by key personnel in the Obama Administration for Dan Savage's It Gets Better Project, including some of our very own NOGLSTP members on the White House staff. There are links to resources for LGBT youth, including the Trevor Project suicide hotline 866-4-U-TREVOR (866-488-7386), the Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network (GLSEN), StopBullying. gov, the Matthew Shepard Foundation, and Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG).

NOGLSTP remains a committed member of the Presidential Advisory Project, working to nominate members and LGBT colleagues for positions in administrative offices and seats on commissions, panels, and boards that advise the administration on important policy issues. Online LGBT Pride: Diversity in Science Blog Carnival Celebration

NOGLSTP members are invited to participate in the return of the "Diversity in Science" blog carnival, whose theme for June is Pride Month -- LGBT science and scientists (www.minoritypostdoc.org/view/bloggers.html#carnival). A blog carnival is one blog post organized by a rotating editor who collects writings, links, photos, and images submitted on the carnival's central theme. Dr. Alberto Roca (founder of the portal MinorityPostdoc.org) facilitates organizing the overall Diversity in Science (DiS) blog carnival while the specific host for June is Dr. Jeremy Yoder, who will edit submissions for his blog "Denim and Tweed" (www.denimandtweed.com/2011/06/show-off-your-pride-and-your-science.html).

The DiS carnivals were started in 2009 by Danielle Lee, author of the award-winning K-12 outreach blog "Urban Science Adventures!" (urban-science.blogspot.com). DiS carnival themes during Black History, Women's History, and Hispanic Heritage Months celebrated early science leaders from these communities. As stated in Danielle's first post, "this carnival celebrates the people of science and engineering - those who innovate, invent, research, teach, and reach out. Michael Annetta Awarded NOGLSTP/USC Lambda STEM Scholarship



As a direct result of last year's Out to Innovate Summit hosted by the LGBT Community at USC, NOGLSTP funded the first-ever scholarship for an LGBTA student studying in a STEM field at USC. This year's winner, announced last month by the USC Lambda LGBT Alumni Association, is Michael Annetta. He will be awarded his scholarship at the Lambda Scholarship Awards luncheon this fall.

Michael received his BA in Film and Communication from Penn State University. After graduation,

he moved to New York City to study at the National Shakespeare Conservatory, where he acted in, stage managed and directed both modern and classical plays. His varied career encompasses acting in and managing national tours, development of new musical works, directing and crafting cabaret performances and producing theatrical and art installation projects.

Michael is currently starting his third year as an MFA graduate student in USC's prestigious Interactive Media Department. His research in interactive media extends beyond the common definition of video gaming to include work in the emerging fields of serious/educational gaming, public interactives and responsive environments, stereoscopic 3D, motion capture and gestural interfaces, alternate reality games and other real-world experience design. He also uses knowledge from his previous career to navigate the exponentially expanding discipline of transmedia storytelling. In other words, Michael is in the new and innovative area of applying engineering, computer graphics, and artistic talents in a pretty geek way! He is a member of the School of Cinematic Art's Mobile and Environmental Media Lab, currently working on interactive architecture and the intersection of technology and human interfaces.

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Echoes from the AAAS 2010 NOGLSTP Symposium on AIDS Treatments

The Associated Press reported on June 2 that the United Nations AIDS Agency urged increased funding for early treatment of people with HIV following a new international study showing it could dramatically reduce the number of new infections through sexual transmission. The study, funded by the NIH Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and due to end in 2015, was terminated early because of the 1,763 couples (heterosexual) where only one partner was infected, those who started treatment immediately were 96 percent less likely to transmit the AIDS-causing virus to their uninfected partner than those who started therapy later. Studies such as this one have been ongoing for several years. NOGLSTP presented reports on these types of studies at a symposium at the 2010 AAAS Annual meeting in San Diego, where the speakers (including participating researchers in this study) unanimously called for early treatment and even prophylactic treatment to reduce the world's AIDS epidemic numbers. However, this would require increasing the amount of money allotted to such an effort by orders of magnitude unless the cost of the drugs drops by orders of magnitude.

Invitation to Participate in Survey on Work-Family Interactions in the LGBT Community

A research team at Northern Arizona University (NAU) in Flagstaff, Arizona, working with Dr. Ann Huffman, Ph.D., of the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences, is conducting research to gain a better understanding of work-family interactions in the LGBT community, investigating the interplay between two important work issues - employee diversity, specifically employee sexual orientation, and work-life balance.

Employed (or previously employed) LGBT individuals are invited to participate in an online survey taking 10-25 minutes to complete. This survey will examine perceptions of personal work environments and how these environments affect relationships at home. Participants will have the opportunity to be entered into a drawing to win one of ten \$20 Barnes & Noble gift cards. Partners or friends of survey participants are also welcome to complete the survey.

I'm heartened that I can add to this tradition as a gay soon-to-be alumnus."

and perseverance." Later themes in the nine published carnivals included environmental awareness, and broadening participation in STEM among K-12 and college students.

After a one-year hiatus, the DiS carnival is relaunching in 2011 with the 10th edition for Pride Month to celebrate the stories of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered scientists and engineers. Submissions should be e-mailed to Dr. Yoder at denmmandtweed@gmail. com by June 27. Experienced bloggers can send a link to their own Pride Month post. If you have no blog, then consider sending a couple of paragraphs or photos. Suggested topics include: inspiring personal/career stories of famous LGBT scientists/leaders; history of LGBT science, scientists, and politics; reflections of one's own identity and its impact on your career/science; coming to terms with being a minority in a majority environment; relevant LGBT identity issues in science, medicine, health, etc.; career and professional resources: websites, articles, books, events, funding, etc.; outreach and mentoring activities to give back to the community; advocacy/ leadership stories and opportunities; stories of safe space work environments in academia, industry, government, etc.; being a minority within a minority, e.g. women scientists of color; educating and building relations with allies; and specific topics unique to the LGBT community, e.g. bisexual and transgender issues. This carnival could be another way to publicize the success of the 2010 NOGLSTP Out to Innovate Summit. The final edited Pride Month carnival post will be published at Denim and Tweed around June 30.

Online blog writing is more informal, personal, and conversational than traditional media reporting. This allows readers to develop a relationship with a blog and its author. The value of this interaction for communication in underserved communities cannot be overstated. In fact, Dr. Danielle Lee's motivation for the DiS carnival was "to showcase the individuals of science as ROLE MODELS." This is accomplished by both the subjects of the blog posts and also by the voice of the blog author. Dr. Yoder has embodied this by writing about his own experience, as well as by applying his expertise in evolutionary biology to sexuality-related topics. Submissions for the Pride Month DiS so far tackle the topics of the invisibility of bisexuality, the contributions of gay rights pioneer and astronomer Frank Kameny, the media confusion over the (incorrectly) reported discovery of the remains of a "gay caveman" this past April, and the story of British cryptographer and mathematician Alan Turing. We expect that the Pride Month blog carnival will raise the visibility of out scientists.

The MinorityPostdoc.org website also promotes Ph.D. scientists to advance in their careers. Dr. Roca coaches both graduate students and postdocs as they transition to their first professional positions in academia, industry, and other job sectors. For Pride Month, the website has been featuring out LGBT scientists in the "Postdoc Spotlight" feature so that recruiters can diversify the talent pool for their open positions. These online tools -- blogs, online communities, and resource web portals -- provide new venues for celebrating the contributions of LGBT scientists and reaching out to the broader LGBT and ally audience.
